Chair and Chief Executive reports

FROM THE CHAIR

I am pleased to present the 2022 Annual Report. Despite another challenging year with COVID-19, we have recorded a profit of \$849,000. This result is partly due to unprecedented bequests, but it also represents strong support from our communities and strong cost controls within the organisation.

Most notably, on Daffodil Day, we raised a record amount through online donations and support from the Principal Sponsor, ANZ, even without our usual street appeal. We also had the most successful Invercargill Society Ball ever, and our Dunedin and Queenstown Ball committees conducted online auctions, continuing to raise funds for us despite the actual events not being able to happen. I also want to particularly acknowledge our CanShop volunteers who kept the shop running, stocked, and even posted record profits despite the challenges.

The year 2021 heralded a change for the health sector, with the government planning for the new Te Whatu Ora (Health NZ) and Te Aka Whai Ora (Mãori Health Authority). The Cancer Society Federation is working collaboratively to position ourselves within this changing landscape as we promote greater alignment across the country guided by our strategic plan and equity charter.

I am grateful to my fellow Board members and to Rachael and the management team for their continuing stewardship of this organistion in these difficult times.

FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE

Covid-19 has again continued to be a shaping factor for the delivery of our Supportive Care services. Our team in the community has remained nimble, supporting patients with changing treatment plans and the particular challenges of dealing with Covid-19 when immunocompromised.

We developed some innovative new partnerships, including a new exercise programme developed and delivered in partnership with the University of Otago that links cancer patients with physiotherapy students. In 2022, we look forward to expanding our in-person services, and particularly to resuming our group sessions.

We kept Daffodil House — our home away from home for people travelling to Dunedin for treatment — open, with greater distancing and cleaning. We were enormously excited to upgrade the bathrooms and carpets, with grants from Alexandra McMillian Trust and Nellie Milnes Charitable Trust, and re-do the garden with support from Mitre 10.

Covid-19 has highlighted for us the enormous blessing we have in support from our communities. Our volunteers continue to be the backbone of the organisation. This year, I would particularly like to thank our volunteer driving service, who continued to drive patients for the whole year to ensure that no one missed their cancer treatment.

In our work on cancer prevention, we welcomed the government's SmokeFree Aotearoa 2025 Action Plan in December 2021. The culmination of many years of hard mahi, the plan will accelerate our progress towards a smokefree future and tackle the harm that smoked tobacco products cause the people of New Zealand.

We provided \$105,500 to national research projects, which this year included for the first time a specific grant programme for early-career Maori researchers. This initiative was developed in partnership with Hei Ãhuru Mãwai Mãori Cancer Leadership Aotearoa.

An enormous thank you to all who have supported us through this time. Cancer doesn't stop and neither will we.



Breast cancer, bowel cancer, prostate cancer and other workshops, and support group sessions were not held due to the COVID-9 pandemic.



Raised \$467,719 on Daffodil Day.

Held 1 Society Ball in Invercargill that raised \$147,166. The Society Balls in Dunedin and Queenstown were not held due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On-line auctions held in lieu of these balls raised \$73,695 and \$23,939 respectively.

Ran Relay For Life events that raised \$272,538

\$790,451 received through donations, grants and community fundraising.

Received \$1,128,645 from bequests.



Contributed \$105,592 towards cancer-related research.



Participating in the government's consultation on the best way to achieve a smokefree future for Aotearoa was central to this year's work.

We contributed to 44 pages of evidence in the Cancer Society of NZ submission on the Smokefree Aotearoa 2025 Action Plan. Our division made 5 separate submissions to parliament on this topic and encouraged 167 stakeholders to have their say.

A key element in our submission was a significant reduction in the number of retailers able to sell tobacco. We shared the voices of 362 members of the Otago Southland community as part of this national petition, which was presented to Labour MP Dr Liz Craig in Invercargill.

We recognise that the best way to achieve a smokefree future is for young New Zealanders to never start smoking and our submissions focused on this and achieving equitable outcomes for all New Zealanders.

After nearly a decade of advocacy, the law prohibiting smoking and vaping in cars carrying children and young people under 18 years of age came into effect in November 2021. 'Drive Smokefree for Tamariki' campaign was delivered online and in the community.

Recognising that alcohol causes at least seven types of cancer, we joined other organisations to reduce the impact of alcohol on youth in Central Otago. "The Plan" which is designed to help parents help their teens to delay drinking alcohol, is a set of tools that were put online and disseminated in print in bottle stores so parents could pick them up, take them home and read them.

We attended and supported 13 community events and gave 2 presentations at national conferences on the importance of built and natural shade in the places we live, learn, work and play to reduce high skin cancer rates in Aotearoa.

We wrote to or meet with decision makers 99 times and made 17 submissions to local councils. We need both healthy environments and people to engage in healthy behaviours to turn the tide on cancer. Our submissions focused on supporting Smokefree and SunSmart environments and reducing the influence of junk food marketing on our tamariki and rangatahi. "He moana pukepuke e kengia e te waka — a choppy sea can be navigated".

Together we can reduce the incidence of cancer in our community.
